



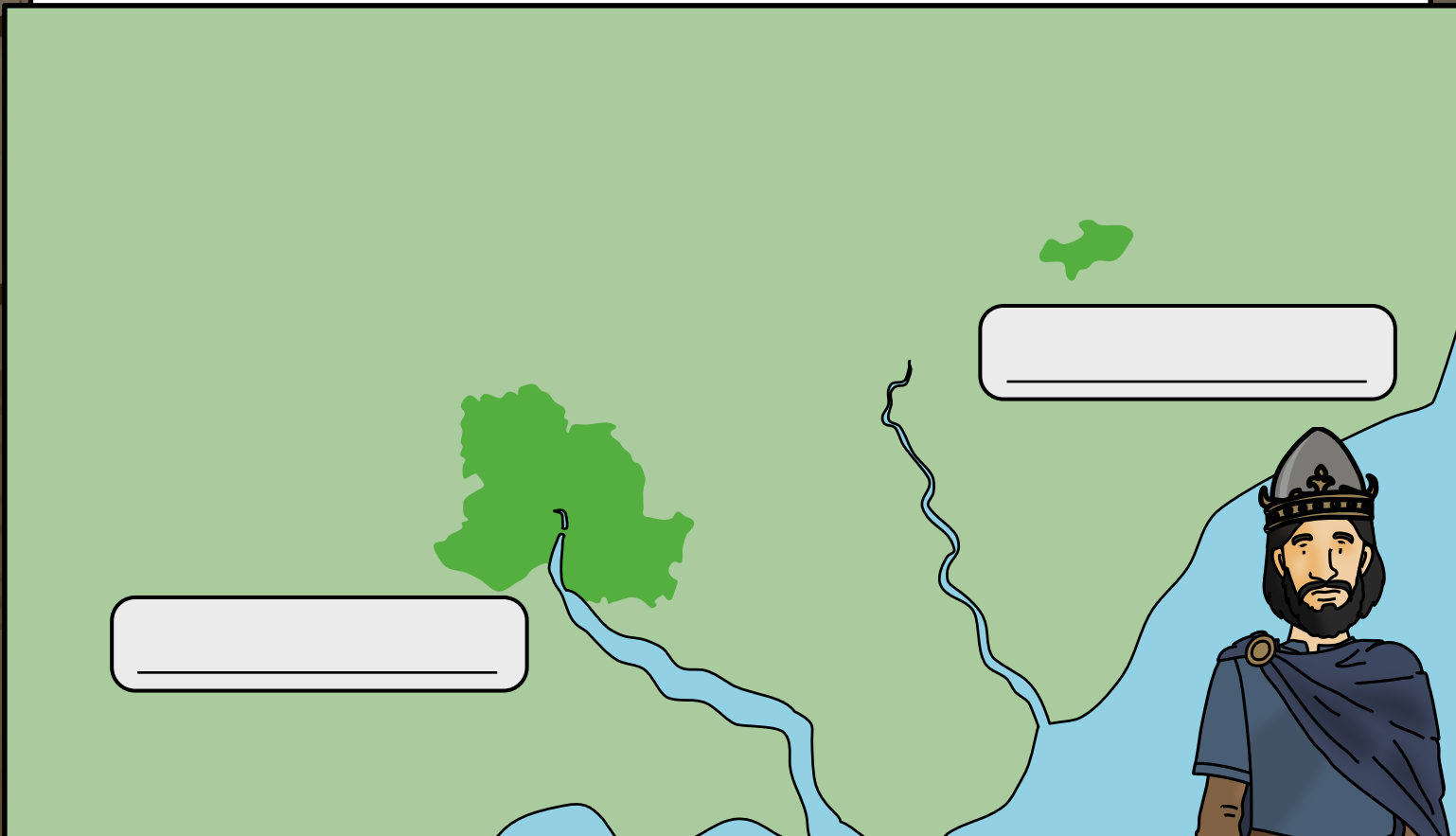
What do we know about the Anglo-Saxon influence in the area?

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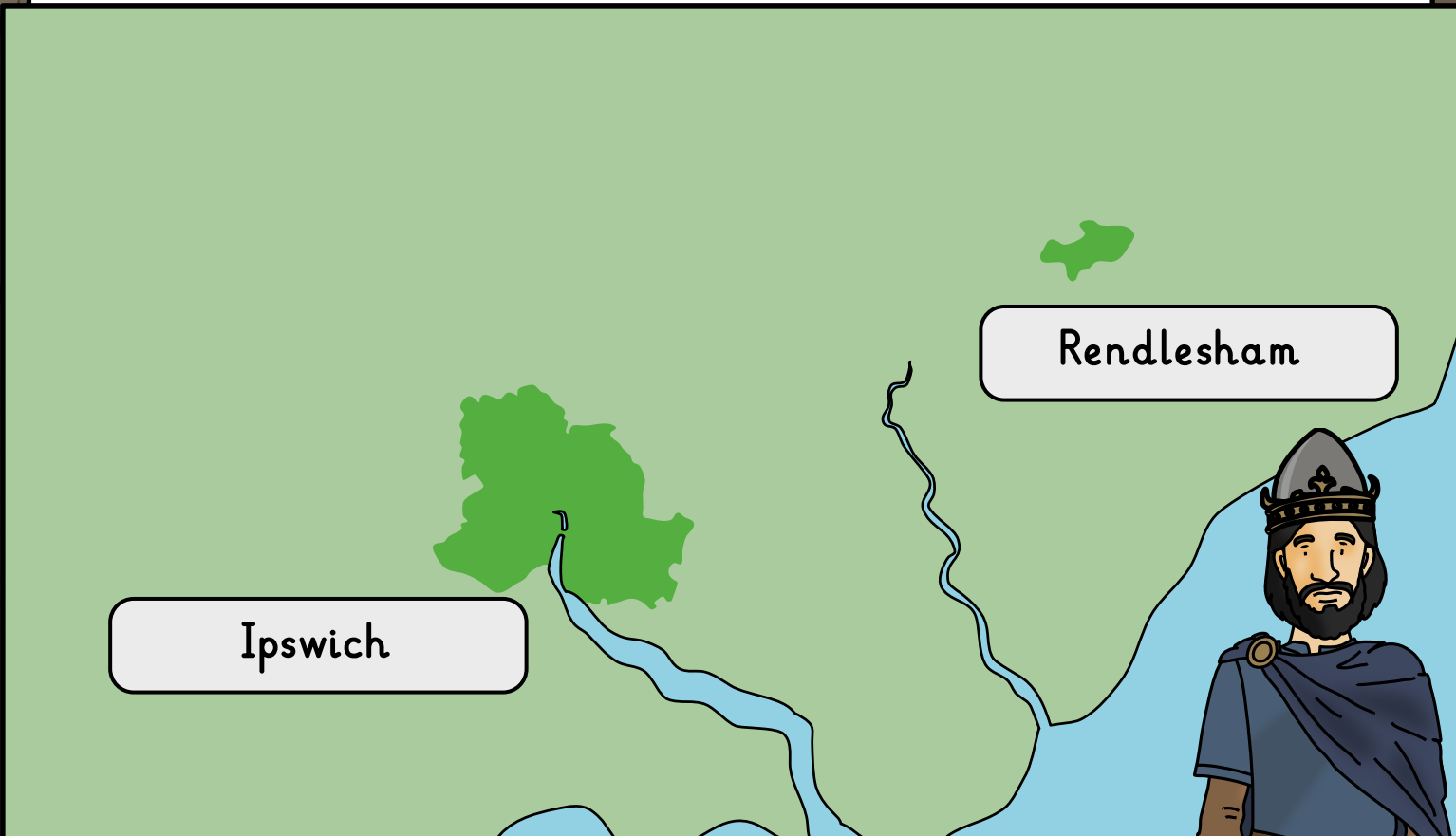
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Historian File - Answers

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Why did archaeologists search and dig in Rendlesham?

Archaeologists were excited to search for a settlement in Rendlesham because of the recent discovery at Sutton Hoo. An old record, written by Bede, also mentioned a place named Rendlesham which is where royal kings and their followers lived. If this could be located, it would lead to the discovery of many Anglo-Saxon artefacts that might tell us more about this time period.



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This item is a sword mount (an item believed to help secure swords when placed inside a scabbard - sheath).



It is made from gold, with delicate beading. The design on the mount is typical of the Anglo-Saxon era. It tells us that whoever owned this was wealthy and whoever made it was a skilled craftsman.

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These are a selection of coins.

They look like they are made from gold and silver. Each coin has an intricate pattern, suggesting highly skilled metalworkers created them. It tells us that there were goods being created and sold in the area and it was a society that valued money.





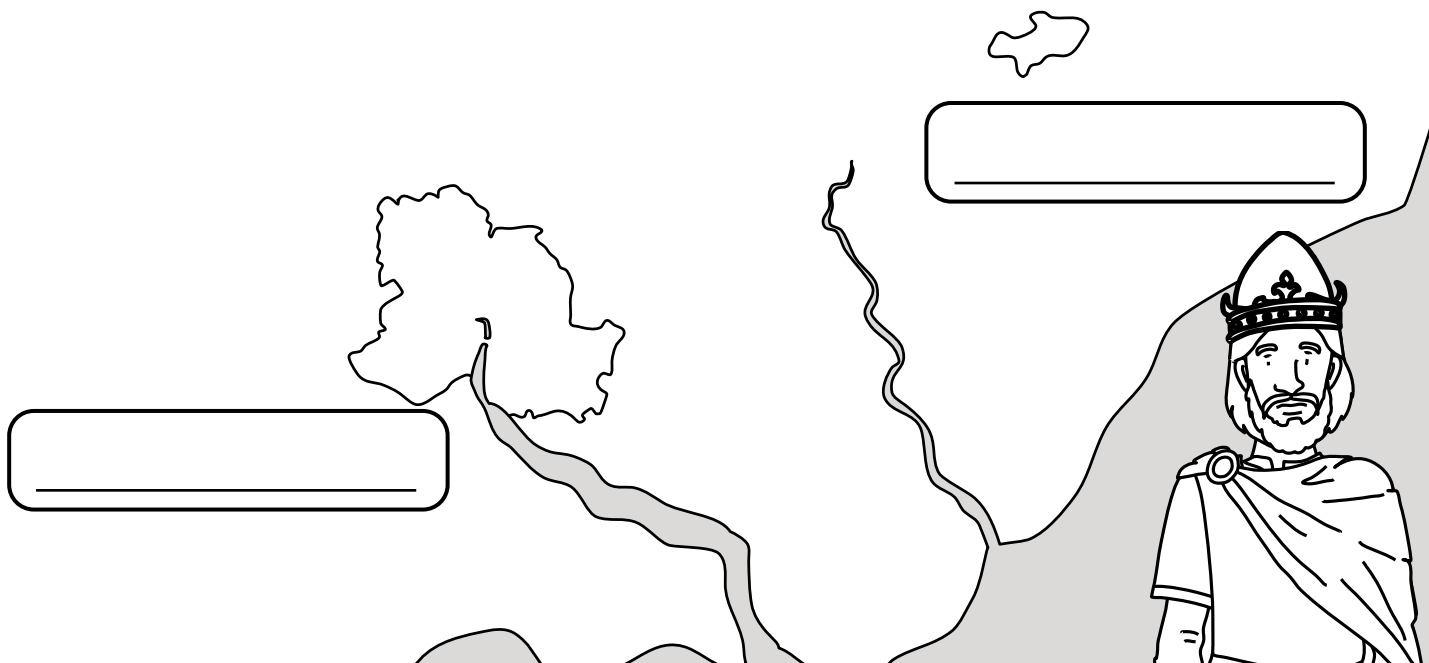
